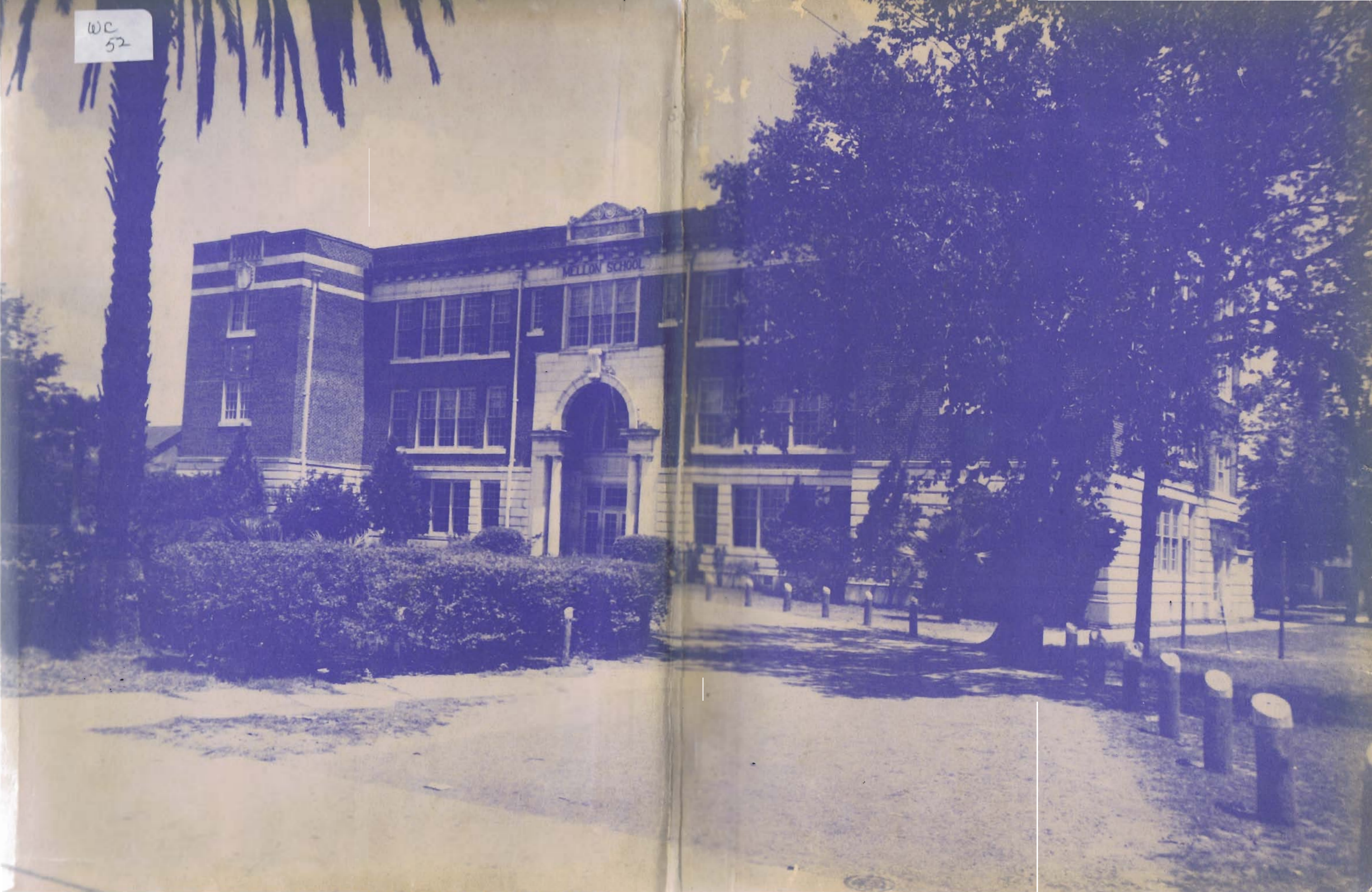

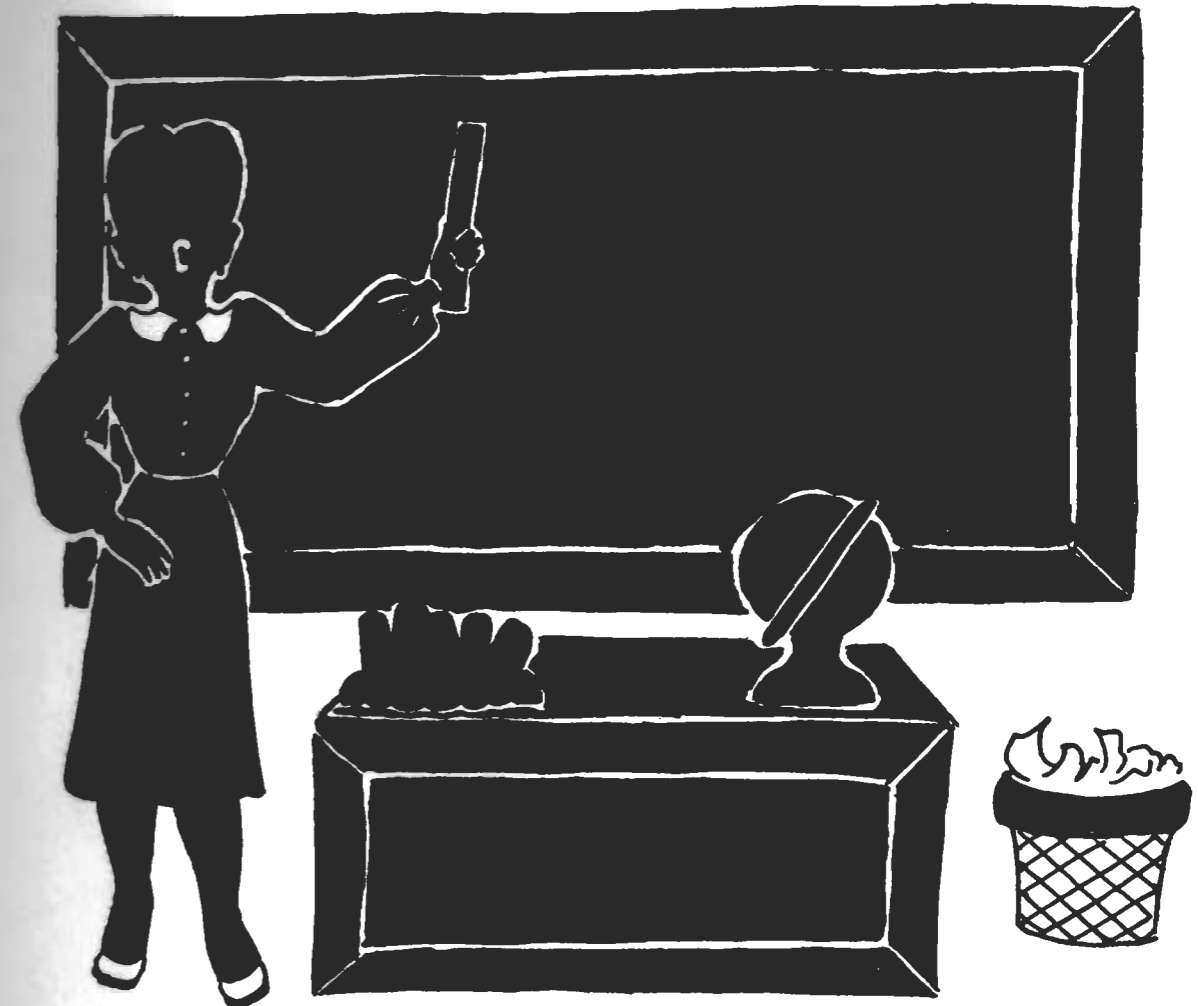
Once again as our school mates assemble,

The Maroons traveled to Starke to take on strong Bradford High, which they defeated 35 to 0.

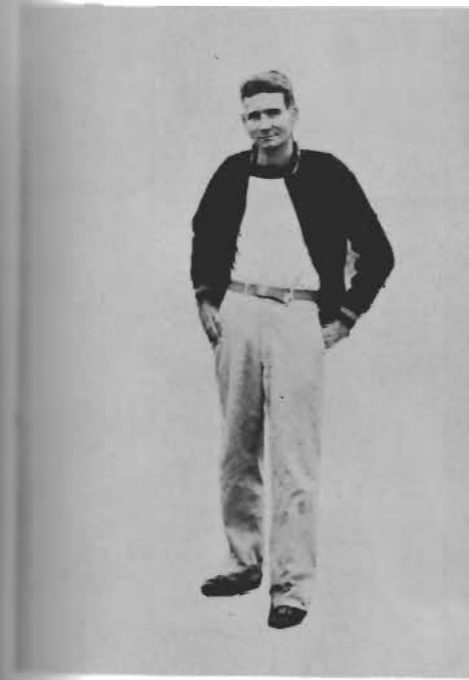
The Seabreeze game was the closest of them all, but the Maroons won 20-19.
