


Tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow!

You'll find us ready and steady, Always boasting for our old High.



PROPHECY

CLASS OF 1929

There I stood on the beach of a small island in the Pacific, where I had been shipwrecked years before. Indeed so many years had passed that I now could no longer number them.

Usually, I felt only despair and discouragement. However, on this day I seemed to have a feeling of curious elation, such as comes as a premonition of good luck. As I paced up and down on the hard sand, my eyes swept the water in search of some sign that I might interpret as a hope of rescue. Suddenly there appeared in the breakers an object resembling a cask. I ran to the edge of the water with eager expectations. Below are recorded some of the news that interested me most:

Senator Q. I. Roberts had lived up to the expectations of the class and had become one of the most famous orators of the country. His last speech had won success for a bill appropriating money for several enormous dams and bridges in the west. I saw in the same paper that Allen Johannesen, with his able assistant, LeRoy McRae, had been awarded the contracts for building many of these.

In another paper there was an article by Prof. Byron K. Andrews of Columbia University. In this article, Professor Andrews called attention to the fact that most married women who had become famous kept their maiden names. Among those listed were Betty Hutt, the modern Pavlowa, married to a congressman from Florida; Elizabeth Yeagley, well known moving picture star, whose wonderful talent had won for her a place in the movie world. Margaret Hutt, married to a famous surgeon, Dr. L. D. Miller, had become a famous poetess. Marcia White was a well known club woman in Florida.

In these papers were interviews with a number of famous people. Prominent among the theatrical notices was the review of Miss Mary Shelley's latest triumph as a Metropolitan star. Albert Gray was an active performer on the vaudeville stage.

Miss Estelle Davis was cited as the nation's most famous coach. She was particularly famous as a basket-ball mentor, being at that time in charge of the international champion 'Gators from the University of Florida. Gertrude Hogeboom had just received an award from an art school in Paris for her famous magazine covers. Cora Solano was known as the assistant of her well known aviator husband, and Beatrice Ecker as the wife of a big motorcycle dealer. Floye Jones was one of the most popular novelists of her day, her latest book having just appeared.


Ordelle Mullis had an advertisement in one of the papers telling of his branch office in Palatka. He was a builder and designer of buildings guaranteed to be constructed without a stick of timber. Walburg Steen was a distinguished civil engineer in the employ of the government. George Thigpen was Mayor of East Palatka, a city which had apparently grown to great size. Miss Jane Justin was president of the National Federation of Women's Clubs.

"The two Olivers of our class," I said to myself, "must be wealthy men about town, for their names are mentioned in almost every social item." Katie Walton was called one of the most brilliant lawyers of the day. An item called attention to the fact that Edna Hancock, though married, was teaching Home Economics in old Putnam High. Imagine Inez Kane as teacher of interpretative dancing! Georgia Black and Nan Gaynor were both nurses in the big hospital at Palatka. Lucille Conway was the owner of "Lucille's Frock Shoppe," and Milton Conway was the proprietor of a chain of filling stations for airplanes. Announcement was also made that Florida citrus fruit is much more in demand than that from California. The reason set forth for this was the wonderful advertising efforts of William Bailey, who has discovered the selling secret of Florida fruit.

When I picked up the last paper, my attention was called to a bold headline referring to the report of John Dunklin concerning a new scientific method which he expected to try out in an attempt to locate Francis Marion Marvick, who had been wrecked on one of the Pacific islands. The article went on to say that she had been lost at sea while on a trip abroad and that so far every effort to locate her had been futile.


